juniors & the main floor for
the rest.

of eggs or fish on other days from the Abbey.

and Steven demoted to be a Vicar.

1321 1st November The Bishop ordained that the
Vicar, Steven & his successors should
have a hall with chambers, kitchen
bakehouse and a garden with pigeon loft
— 1 acre of land & pasturage for his
swine & should be self supporting.

August 1348 Plague broke out at Weymouth

Jan 1349. The Bishop of Bath & Wells wrote

"The contagion of pestilence hath left
many churches without a priest - many
are dying without the sacrament of penance.

Therefore I would enjoin you to confess
to a layman if no priest available and
— if need be, to a woman.

Faith must, as in other matters, suffice.

47% of clergy in our diocese, died

More than $\frac{1}{3}$ of the population died

Probably 3 of our own vicars died.

Hanging Tree

Two sisters - Angel & Sol or Suliana Pointing are in the picture above at Stantonbury House at Corston Field. They were probably the daughters of George Pointing.

They recounted to their relations that, as children, they could remember hearing about the man who was hung on the Corston tree. He was hung for sheep stealing. A cottage known as the 'mutton house' at North Breach was said to be lived in by a thief who used to steal and then hide the sheep down the well.

If he was hung for sheep stealing, it must have been previous to 1829, as the laws were changed at this time.

He might have been hung in Bath after a Quarter Sessions trial and then been hung

on the Cross tree as a warning

to be lived in by a thief who used to steal
and then hide the sheep down the well.

He might have been hung in Bath after a
Quarter Sessions trial and then been hung
in chains on the Cross tree as a warning
to others.

Many persistent rumours support
this title of the "Hanging tree" - possibly
an executed rebel hung in chains after
the Monmouth Rebellion - "Blood on the
tree" myth and the memory of the chains
that fell off the tree in 1903.

The tree lost its top after the gas
main was put in in 1912 and eventually
died of Dutch Elm Disease in
